WORDS OF WISDOM

A Brief Look at the New Testament's Mastermind St Paul

A theme for the Season of Creation

Creation brought to a state of peace

*An encouraging suggestion: the following makes better sense if you find a Bible and turn to Paul's Letter to the **Romans ch8 vv18-25** – only 8 verses!*

The original meaning of the word 'redemption' is liberation – freeing up. It is how a slave felt when bought out of slavery. It is first and foremost a *knowing and a feeling*, that all is well and that there is no need for some awful pall of guilt to hang over us. It's like a great weight being lifted from our shoulders. Then, it is a truth about God: the way God releases us from the burden of realising that we constantly get things wrong.

Christians please note: that is a strong theme in the Old Testament, where it IS about a loving, forgiving God as well as about the stern, ethically demanding God of the Ten Commandments.

The New Testament message is even stronger: Paul understands the death of the crucified Christ to be a redeeming sacrifice. In Paul's Jewish experience, the sacrifice of an animal in the Temple was held to have a redemptive, freeing-up effect. In trying to make sense of the apparent failure of the crucifixion, Paul seizes on the death of Jesus as being redemptive in the same way – but, of course, on a much grander, all-encompassing scale. Paul assumes the truth of redemption by the crucified Christ as obvious without explaining it further.

Over the centuries thoughtful clerics have said, 'But we don't actually believe in animal sacrifice...' and have tried to bring the concept into their own age by theorising (let's be brief!) about God needing to satisfy his honour (like a medieval knight), or about God (like a judge) having to condemn, then pardon, erring humans by allowing Jesus to die in their place. The earliest theory was about the Devil requiring satisfaction. We have come to understand that each of these theories has serious faults – BUT we DO know that behind the theories is a forgiving God, however faltering our human explanations may be.

In Paul's Epistle to the Romans (more a treatise than a letter) he presents his thinking on redemption. But in chapter 8 he goes a huge stage further

by applying the redemption concept to the whole of creation. All created life ‘groans’ and will, in God’s good time, be redeemed: what does he mean ‘groans’?? Destructive storms? Drought? Animals eating other animals? Human *bodies* suffering from illness? Hostile seas? Unexpected unseasonal weather that leads to crop failure?

Our modern response may be to say that nature is not ‘groaning’ – that is how it is – it does not need redeeming – it’s wonderful as it is – whatever is Paul on about? In Paul’s world of 2000 years ago nature felt more untamed and dangerous than it does to us, producing in people fear rather than wonder. Nature was chaotic and out of control – what Paul calls ‘groaning’. He then asserts, without evidence but with unflinching faith, that God will bring the created world into a wondrous state of redeemed peace, just as God had offered humanity redemption through Christ. The first stage in this poetic vision was for creation to ‘witness’ the glorious future that God had planned for humanity. The second stage was his hope that ‘the whole of created life will be rescued from the tyranny of change and decay’.

We can’t help asking what exactly he meant. Then it occurs to me to wonder what he would make of modern medicine? Our observation of galaxy after distant galaxy, and space flight to the nearer parts of the universe? Our understanding of the human body, of chemical reactions, of quantum physics? Computers and AI? Surely he would become less scared of the created world and, instead, be able to react with the wonder that we feel.

Would he then see this (the processes of modern science and technology) as a gift of God? A freeing up of nature ‘from the tyranny of change and decay’? An expression of God’s peace to which God has brought us? I think he might well see it that way. His ‘hope’ that God’s purposes were gradually being fulfilled would be based on real evidence.

Have you noticed over the years how we celebrate the Hymn to Love of 1 Corinthians 13? Given the climax of ‘faith, hope and love’, we make an easy assumption about ‘faith’ (it’s obvious) and tend to forget ‘hope’ just because Paul gives the top place to ‘love’. In this chapter 8 of Romans, ‘hope’ is *the* basis of his thinking. His ‘faith’ is so strong that his ‘hope’ is as near as anyone can get to certainty.

Guiding me in some of these thoughts is the Commentary of Paul’s Epistle to the Romans by the great Congregationalist scholar C H Dodd (who chaired the panel of translators of the New English Bible).

When approaching these eight verses, Dodd summarises the greatness of St Paul, in breadth and depth, in the first half of Romans. Just pause and take in how amazing Paul is:

At this point the argument rises to a new level. We have heard Paul declaiming against the vices of the age like a satirist, speculating on the knowledge of God and the conscience of man like a philosopher, arguing from Scripture like a rabbi and analysing experience like a psychologist. Now he speaks with the vision of a poet.

Internationally

We pray for peace. At the time of going to press the world is still in a very confused and worrying state. We have the appalling conditions of the Palestinians in Gaza and the West Bank and the tragic situation in Ukraine. Is there any hope of a ceasefire in either area? The position seems to change from day to day. Then there are so many other worrying situations such as the civil wars in Sudan and Burma. There is so much to pray for!

MEDECINS SANS FRONTIERES (MSF)

(The church's charity for 2025)

This month an update from Gaza. This could be described as political but I have no reason to disbelieve what MSF tell us.

MSF teams warn that it will be simply impossible to force one million people – including hundreds of critically ill patients and newborn babies – out of Gaza City and into overcrowded and under-resourced areas in the centre and south of the Strip.

This would represent a death sentence for one million Palestinians.

Relentless bombing by the Israeli forces and the advance of the ground offensive are killing hundreds of Palestinians and driving them from their homes and shelters, sometimes multiple times. This follows a pattern of complete destruction previously witnessed by MSF teams in Rafah, in the south of the Gaza Strip.

“Some of our colleagues have been displaced more than eleven times since 2023,” says Jacob Granger, Emergency coordinator for MSF in Gaza. Makeshift shelters offer little safety as bombing continues, often targeting areas to which survivors had already fled. An estimated one million displaced persons now occupy just 15 percent of Gaza’s territory, with conditions worsened by the destruction of almost 90 percent of water and sanitation systems.

“MSF continues to distribute water in the city but, with no water reserves left, if the Israeli forces make drinkable water production and distribution impossible, people will die in a matter of days”, says Granger. Outbreaks of disease such as acute diarrhoea are already spreading in overcrowded, unsanitary living conditions.

A healthcare system on the brink

Israel’s offensive is deliberately wrecking Gaza’s healthcare capacity. More than half of the hospitals have been rendered inoperative; those remaining function on the brink of collapse under targeted attacks. Bed occupancy rates reached 300 percent at Al Ahli Hospital, 240 percent at Shifa Hospital and 210 percent at Rantissi Hospital.

The ongoing escalation in Gaza City is threatening to close 11 of 18 partially functioning hospitals in the Gaza Strip, as well as other healthcare facilities. Meanwhile, the health authorities report zero stock remaining for over half of essential drugs.

Medical staff have endured repeated raids, health workers themselves have been killed, detained or threatened, including an MSF doctor still in detention with no formal charges against him.

In the medical facilities we support in Gaza City, we are seeing an increased number of wounded people with increasingly serious injuries. However, patients who need intensive care are at risk of dying if forced to evacuate due to hospital closures. People with disabilities, people who are sick or wounded will not be able to evacuate.

Starvation as a policy

The siege has triggered a famine: restrictions on food, clean water, medicine, and aid deliveries are causing acute malnutrition rates to skyrocket.

Civilians desperate for aid at distribution points face deadly force. For months, MSF clinics responded to mass casualties resulting from Israeli fire at the food distribution sites managed by the Gaza Humanitarian Foundation (GHF) – the Israeli-US-backed body that has militarised aid distribution.

Israel's ground operations must stop immediately

Israeli forces aim to push Palestinians out of Gaza City through genocide, ethnic cleansing and creating impossible life conditions.

Nowhere is safe, and the vastly insufficient quantities of aid are being delivered through routes that are extremely dangerous for civilians. All the while, the destruction of critical infrastructure is ongoing and deliberate.

MSF calls for:

The immediate end to the use of evacuation orders as a means of forcible displacement, a lasting ceasefire, and the entry of humanitarian aid at scale.

We ask for the protection of medical facilities and the coordinated movements of humanitarian organisations.

The systematic destruction of an entire city and population must end.

We call on Israel's allies to stop arms transfers to Israel immediately and ramp up the pressure to halt the offensive.

Without urgent, radical intervention, Gaza faces total annihilation.
